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### What is a **COOPERATIVE?**

A cooperative is a business organization that is owned and governed by members who use its products, supplies, or services, rather than by stockholders.

Cooperatives vary in type, membership size, and services, but all are formed to meet the specific objectives of members, and are structured to adapt to members' changing needs.

Cooperatives adhere to a set of seven cooperative principles that guide how the business is run and how decisions are made.



Although people have been working together for their mutual benefit throughout human history, the cooperative form of business organization began during the Industrial Revolution.

Cooperatives are useful for promoting the interests of the less powerful members of society. Farmers, producers, workers, and consumers accomplish more collectively than they can individually.

### Know your Co-Ops

Today, there are nearly **30,000 cooperatives** in the United States, with more than 100 million members. In nearly every part of the economy, people have joined together to do business more effectively or to get the products and services they need—from food to agriculture services and equipment to childcare—through cooperatives.

### Voluntary and Open Membership

As a member, you can join, do business with, or leave the cooperative at any time.

### Democratic Owner Control

One member, one vote. All members have an equal voice in making policies and electing representatives.

### Member Economic Participation

The profit of the cooperative is returned to the members, reinvested in the cooperative, or used to provide owner services.

### Autonomy and Independence

Cooperatives are self-governed organizations and are controlled by their members. Only members can make changes to the cooperative.

### **Education, Training and Information**

Cooperatives provide technical training and education to members so they can contribute to the development and growth of the cooperative.

### Cooperation among Cooperatives

Cooperatives serve their members and strengthen the movement by working with local, regional, national and international structures.

### **Concern for Community**

While focused on member needs, cooperatives work for the sustainable development of their communities through policies approved by their members.



Chief criteria of this business type are participation in management, sharing profits, sharing losses, ownership of assets together, and having a firm name, a single joint bank account, and a single set of records. No one factor is controlling.
- 6. A systematic series of actions directed to some end.
- 7. The surplus remaining after total costs are deducted from total revenue.
- 8. Difference between the cost price and selling price of a product.
- 9. A person's occupation or profession.
- 10. Placement, location, arrangement or disposition of terms.
- 12. A form of business organization in which the owners have shares in a separate legal entity that itself can own assets and borrow money.
- 14. Items purchased to carry on a farm's operation. Such items include fertilizers, pesticides, seed, fuel, and animal feed.

- 11. Money invested in a business to generate income.


### Cooperatives Venn Diagram



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### What's a Supply Chain?




Cooperatives help in the production stage with seed & input recommendations, crop scouting, and even custom spreading, spraying and planting services.

### Marketing



By pooling farmers' commodities as well as having the ability to store them until market prices are at their most favorable, cooperatives give farmers more bargaining power for the price of their product.

### **Processing**



Some cooperatives handle processing from commodity to finished product, and others simply market the agricultural commodity to other entities for processing.

### **Distribution**





Once the commodity is processed into a finished product, it's delivered to the consumer. As you can see, there are many steps and many people involved in the supply chain of getting a commodity from the field to the market.
